FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

2019 Attendance

Overall, our school continues to attain a high level of student attendance. Parents, please endeavour to maintain this and consider the risk factors listed below for reduced attendance. Whilst we acknowledge there are legitimate reasons for absences from school, please think carefully before removing students for extended periods or non-essential "days off".

90 - 100%	attendance is considered regular
80 - 89%	is considered at risk. (80% equates to
	missing 1 day per week)
60 - 79%	is considered at moderate risk (60 %
	equates to missing 2 days every week)
0 - 59%	is considered severe educational risk

Key messages for parents include:

- going to school is a legal requirement;
- every day at school matters;
- children need to attend school regularly so they can take advantage of ALL the educational opportunities available;
- school enables children to build on their knowledge and skills each day, each week and each year;
- consistently poor school attendance and lateness to class can affect children's educational progress;
- patterns of punctuality and regular school attendance are developed at an early age;
- good attitudes towards attendance that are well established will help prevent problems as children progress to secondary school;
- school helps children build confidence in areas such as communication, teamwork, organisation and social skills, and children who miss school may find it difficult to keep up friendships in the class.
- While family time is very valuable, it is important to realise that taking children out of school for family holidays reduces the amount of time available for learning and is detrimental to their education.
- Every 10% in the above table equates to one year of missed schooling if that average is maintained from year 1 to year 10. Therefore, 60% means 4 years of school missed.














Last Monday, on the 29th of April, the Year 5/6 class met Ron Wiggins, who has been to Antarctica twice, but hasn't been to the icy cold continent for over 50 years. The Year 5/6 class really enjoyed Ron coming in and teaching us more about Antarctica from his own thoughts and experiences. He shared near death experiences and his favourite memories. Ron made many new friends on this expedition. He didn't think he'd get accepted. He was just an ordinary mechanic but he had worked in isolated places where there weren't many people, and that is why he was chosen and received a letter telling him of the big surprise that he was going.

When he left Antarctica he had many tales to tell and here are some facts he has told us from his experience:

- * Antarctica isn't extremely cold when there is no snow fall.
- * Huskies aren't allowed to be in Antarctica because they are not native and they were killing native animals.
- * Some boats weren't strong enough to push through the thick nasty ice.
- * Huskies used to sit on top of roofs and wait for food to be thrown onto the cold rusty roof.
- * People had two cameras; one was black and white and the other was coloured. They had two of them because the colour sometimes didn't work out as well.
